director of interfraternal activites

Chapters with more than 35 members should have a director of interfraternal activities, though smaller chapters may also choose to have this position. They report to the vice president: Panhellenic and serve on the joint chapter management team (JCMT). Depending on chapter size and structure, this position also directs an interfraternal activities committee. They are responsible for planning activities for the chapter that help the chapter interact with other organizations.
